

Active	The structure of Jigsaw lessons encourages children to take part in varied activities during a lesson. The pace is quick and children are encouraged to participate, taking an active role in their learning. Children are taught to have an awareness of their own body and respond to it using mindfulness techniques.
Ambitious	Children are taught how to set goals and recognise that failure is a part of the journey to success. A growth mindset culture adopted by the whole school helps our children to be resilient and understand the power of 'yet', allowing them to be ambitious.
Compassionate	Learning to celebrate difference encourages children to become sympathetic, empathetic and compassionate members of society. The curriculum also teaches children to understand how situations may affect others and potential feelings surrounding this.
Connectors	Our PSHE curriculum allows children to develop their social skills in order to make positive connections with others. It supports them in learning how to initiate and maintain friendships, giving them a secure foundation for navigating relationships and interactions when they are older.
Explorers	The PSHE curriculum allows children to explore each lesson in different ways. Some including: scenarios, debating, art activities, visual activities that get children to think beyond, explore discussions around topical issues and activities which develop the children's personalities and identity.
Inclusive	Jigsaw supports the learning of all. It discusses issues and topics relating to our community and society, encouraging discussions around celebrating differences and challenging the idea of 'normal'. We make use of assemblies and awareness events to extend this.
Independent	Jigsaw supports children to be critical with their own thinking. It encourages them to develop and share their own opinions on key ideas within our society. This allows all children to learn about themselves and the importance of their roles in the global world.
Thinkers	PSHE spiral curriculum encourages children to build on their prior knowledge. Higher order questioning enables children to relate scenarios to their own lives. They develop critical thinking skills that help them to make informed decisions.
